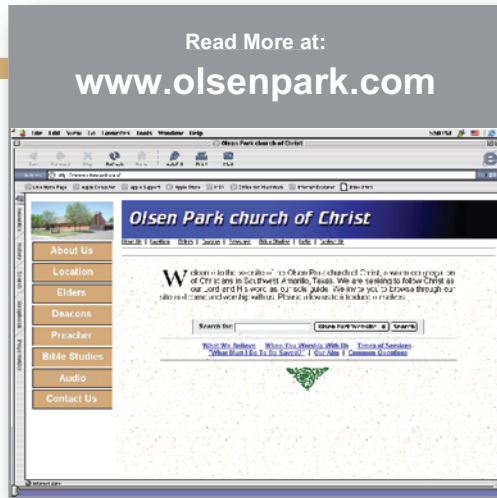


as were baptized into Christ have put on Christ.” (Galatians 3:26-28). Paul himself had once been taught this same truth. As Acts 22:16 recounts that he was told - “**now why are you waiting? Arise and be baptized, and wash away your sins, calling on the name of the Lord.**” At that time, he (just like the Philippian Jailer) was obedient and put on Christ in baptism.

What Must We Do To Be Saved?
As we consider our own relationship to God we would do well to consider the example of the Philippian jailer. The same things that were involved in his conversion still apply to mankind today.

If we would be saved we must believe in Jesus Christ as the son of God, confess Him before others, repent of our sins and be baptized into Christ for the remission of our sins.

We are so glad that you joined us today.
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“What Must I Do To Be Saved?”

When the apostle Paul and his companion Silas were imprisoned in the city of Philippi because of their work for the cause of Christ, after the Lord miraculously freed them, they were asked a very important question by their jailer. The frightened man asked them earnestly - **“Sirs, what must I do to be saved?”** (Acts 16:30, NKJV). Although he may have been concerned with his physical salvation because the prison security had been compromised, the apostle Paul taught him something much more valuable. He responded - **“Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and you will be saved, you and your household.”** (Acts 16:31). The jailer, heeded Paul’s words. The text tells us - **“Then they spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all who were in his house. And he took them the same hour of the night and washed their stripes. And**



immediately he and all his family were baptized.” (Acts 16:32-33).

This example serves as an important lesson to us in this day and age when we must ask this same question in our lives. Notice some part of this account:

I. Belief The first thing that the apostle teaches him is that he must believe in Jesus Christ. The book of Hebrews tells us - **“without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of those who diligently seek Him.”** (Hebrews 11:6).

This is not a faith based upon opinion, or personal imagination, but on the solid evidence of the message of God’s revealed word. Romans 10:17 teaches us - **“faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God.”**

The kind of belief that Paul advocates is not simply a recognition of who Jesus

is, but an active and living faith that lives out what it has accepted. Part of this involves the courage to acknowledge before others the faith which one has come to possess. In Matthew 10:32,33 Jesus taught - **“Therefore whoever confesses Me before men, him I will also confess before My Father who is in heaven. But whoever denies Me before men, him I will also deny before My Father who is in heaven.”** James teaches us that true faith must be accompanied with obedience, declaring to us - **“faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead.”** (James 2:17).

II. Repentance. In the account of the Philippian jailer, after Paul told the man about faith in Jesus he **“spoke the word of the Lord to him”** (Acts 16:32). Something about what Paul said led the man to do a dramatic thing - **“he took them the same hour of the night and washed their stripes”** (Acts 16:33). Did Paul talk to the man about repentance as he had done on other occasions? In Acts 26:20 Paul claimed that he declared - **“to those in Damascus and in Jerusalem, and**

throughout all the region of Judea, and then to the Gentiles, that they should repent, turn to God, and do works befitting repentance.” Was the necessity for repentance a part of the “word of the Lord” which he declared to the man? It certainly was when Peter taught on the day of Pentecost. When Peter was asked - **“what shall we do?”** (Acts 2:37). He responded - **“Repent, and let every one of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins; and you shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit”** (Acts 2:38). Repentance means that we stop doing what is wrong and commit ourselves to do right. In the example of the Philippian jailer this seems to be what is reflected in his tending to their wounds. Perhaps he been responsible for some of those wounds.

III. Baptism. The text tells us that after all these things - **“immediately he and all his family were baptized.”** (Acts 16:33). In his epistle to the Galatians Paul taught that in baptism one puts on Christ. He wrote - **“For you are all sons of God through faith in Christ Jesus. For as many of you**
